Administrator's Note



In less than two months, the Shelby County Primary Election will be held.

At the Febru-

ary monthly meeting of the Shelby County Election Commission, the commissioners certified the candidates that will appear on the May 1st ballot. Shortly after that the official ballot was built, and once ready, it was mailed to all residents serving overseas in the military who requested an absentee ballot.

When that group of absentee ballots was mailed, the election cycle officially began. After that there is a constant whirlwind of activity at the Election Commission, as staff prepares to mail out absentee ballots to other out-oftown residents, and schedule offsite election polling places. Ballots are taken into every nurs-

ing home in the county to make it easy for elderly voters to participate in every election. Teams of election officials take the ballots not only to nursing homes, but to rehabilitation facilities and hospitals. Ballots also are taken to county correctional facilities so citizens convicted of misdemeanor crimes, or those awaiting trial can vote.

This is just one of many aspects of election administration that occurs behind the scenes, before Early Voting begins, which brings me to a very important point.

During Early Voting, April 11 - April 26, registered voters may vote at any of 21 locations around the county. Please check our website for locations and times. Lines are typically much shorter during Early Voting, which is a great convenience to voters.

On Election Day, voters must

vote at the polling place assigned to the precinct in which they reside. Early voters receive the same ballot they would receive on Election Day, but because there are so many more machines used that day, only the ballot for each precinct is programmed into machines before they are delivered to the precincts.

I encourage each and every one of you to take advantage of the convenience of Early Voting.

Make voting a family affair. Pick up your parents and vote with them, or go cast your votes at the same time your adult children do.

Mark your calendars so you will remember the dates when you can exercise your most fundamental right as a citizen. So, either during Early Voting, or on Election Day JUST GO VOTE!!!

- Petitions are still being issued for those running as Independent Candidates in the County General Election August 2, 2018. The deadline for returning signed petitions is Noon April 5, 2018.

Polling Place Changes

There are seven polling place changes that will affect some voters on Election Day, May 1. Check www.shelbyvote.com to see a complete list of polling places.

We do everything possible to notify affected voters of the change well in advance of an upcoming election, and timing is critical in mailing notices. If they are mailed too early, a voter might forget the location change. The Election Commission mails notices at least 30 days prior to the election following the change and publicizes the changes as much as possible.

Changing locations is never a random decision that is taken lightly. We wish they were never necessary. Polling locations change for various reasons that are completely out of our control.

For instance, one of the schools that was used as a polling place closed. In another case, there was inadequate handicap access to the building. If a structure used as a polling place is conducting renovations and parking is not available, or it makes it difficult for voters to enter and exit that may also prompt a change.

Divine Life Church housed a polling place, but sold its property to a different church, so the name changed to The Truth Church. Although this is not technically a polling place location change, voters may be confused and think they are going to the wrong place, so they are mailed letters, too.

It's always a good idea to check the VOTER tab at www.shelbyvote.com before an election just to make sure you know where you need to go on Election Day. Remember though, if you VOTE EARLY, you can vote at any of the 21 locations, which is always a good choice.

Check Out Our Updated Website!

The upgraded version of the SCEC website, www.shelbyvote.com, is now up and running. Visitors to the site will immediately notice a dramatic change. The site has a cleaner look and is much more user friendly.

While the old site had many tabs down the middle, making it sometimes confusing to find information, the upgraded site contains only six top tabs: VOTERS, POLL WORKERS, CANDIDATES, ELECTIONS, OUTREACH and a general information tab, called SCEC.

"We want the public to be able to access information as quickly and easily as possible," Linda Phillips said.

The first tab on the dropdown list under VOTERS gives people instant information on how to check their registration status and where they need to go vote on Election Day.

SCEC is always looking for qualified

poll workers, so the POLLWORKER tab has a dropdown list that provides specifics about how to become a poll worker, the pay rate, responsibilities and an application.

The CANDIDATES tab at the top includes information about which SCEC often receives calls, like campaign signs and rules for poll watchers.

Information on upcoming elections, as well as information on past elections is under the

ELECTIONS tab.

Upcoming elections lists each of the scheduled elections in 2018 and 2019. Click on a specific election for important information like early voting places, as well as dates and

times of operation. Sample ballots will be posted 45 days before each election.

Under OUTREACH you'll find information about upcoming classes, touring the Operations Center, volunteering at SCEC, programs for future voters and our Voting Rocks! program.

The SCEC tab includes meeting minutes, bios of the commissioners and key staff members, statistics and policies as well as a page about the history of the Election Commission.
