The county primaries are behind us and the election results were certi-

fied on May 15th.

After that, we began working to put things in order in anticipation of the August County General and State Primary Elections. The military and overseas ballots went out on June 18th. 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Election News

- Tuesday, July 3rd is the last day to register to vote for the August 2, 2018 election.
- Public test of voting machines for Early Voting will be on July 11, 2018 at 9:00 am at the Operations Center, 980 Nixon Drive.
- Early voting begins on Friday, July 13th. See our website for details as some locations, days, and times have changed. Vote at any Early Voting location!
- The date and time for the public inspection of Election Day voting machines is Monday, July 23, 2018. at 9:00 am.
- Saturday, July 28, 2018 is the final day of early voting.
- Thursday, August 2, 2018 is Election Day! You must vote at the location for your precinct if you wait until Election Day to vote.

Fun Facts-

Election Day 200 years ago was an entirely different sort of event.

The crowd gathered at the Courthouse for a public party. Eating, drinking, and parading were common and votes were cast with a public voice vote. Fights were not uncommon.

It was until the 1890's that the Austrian ballot, also known as the secret ballot, became commonly used.

Although lever voting machines were patented in 1889, use of them in Shelby County didn't happen until the early 1950's.

All ballots will have a Shelby County Charter Referendum question on them. The full text will appear on the ballot. Here is the summary of the charter amendment:

The proposed Charter amendment would change the County Charter to have the salaries of the County Mayor, Sheriff, Assessor, Clerk, Register, and Trustee governed by state law. Tennessee Code Annotated Section 8- 24-102 provides for minimum salaries to be based on population. This same law provides that any annual increase would be based on the percentage increase given to state employees. Currently, only the board of County Commissioners sets salaries.

Bartlett residents will see a race for the Bartlett Municipal Judge. Residents in some parts of Memphis will see the Memphis City Council Super District 9 candidates on their ballots.

Getting Ready for an Election!

During Early Voting, 185 voting machines will be used. Each one must be double-checked to make sure that it has a zero balance, in other words, that no activity has taken place on the machine. Once that is done, there is a public inspection, open to anyone who wishes to see the machines prior to Early Voting.

Each machine has several tamperevident seals put on it, and each seal has an individual number which is recorded on a form. When each team of poll workers prepare to open the polling place, the seals are double-checked.

Then the machines are packed so they are ready for movers to pick them up and deliver them to the various locations. These machines will not be re-used on Election Day. In the days leading up to the start of Early Voting, all workers will

come to the Operations Center for a training class and to pick up the packet of supplies that will be used at polling places. This includes pens, paper, forms, posters, maps, as well as keys to the location, unless it is privately owned.

As soon as the Early Voting machines are out of the warehouse, work begins preparing the nearly 1,000 machines that will be used on Election Day.

Then we begin preparing the Electronic Poll Books (EPB). These are the machines poll workers use to check and make sure you are registered before you receive you card and go to a machine to vote. Each EPB must have the previous election re-

moved. Then each one is tested. After Early Voting ends, the most up-to-date version of the voter registration records will be loaded on all of the nearly 600 units.

In the next issue, look for the next installment of Election Readiness, covering inside events leading up to Election Day.
